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



Colton residents' charity payout in December

We've reached the time of the year when the Trustees of the Colton Fuel Allotment charity, distribute the annual payment to Colton households.

Each year, the charity can distribute a payment to each household from income derived from the rent of a local piece of land.

There are a number of fuel allotment charities in parishes throughout Norfolk – more than 90 are registered with the Charity Commissioners. The charity is required to appoint trustees – at present there are three. Their role is to decide the amount of the payment and how to distribute it. The most effective method, in the past has been at the **Colton Village Hall Christmas Bingo** to be held this year, on **Saturday, December 7**



at 7pm. (Doors open at 6.00pm). There is one payment for each household and there is a requirement that people have lived in their home for at least a year.

Update on recycling your blister pack waste

You may remember that about 18 months ago, I implemented a plan to collect and recycling blister packs. To refresh your memories I applied for, and received, a grant from South Norfolk Council to have some recycling boxes made up which were distributed around Colton, Marlingford, Easton and

Bawburgh churches, village halls and local pubs. The boxes were going to be emptied regularly and the blister packs taken to Supadrug who, at the time, said they would accept our collections.

However, while I was getting the scheme off the ground, a major recycle company called Teracycle

to whom Supadrug sent their collections, suspended its scheme as they, along with Supadrug, were unable to cope with the volume of blister packs they were receiving. I could relate to that having collected five very large sacks of blister packs in a period of about three weeks from four villages. So the whole idea collapsed and the boxes are now stored in our attic waiting for a new scheme to be launched.

On a positive note however, I have recently received an email from Boots to say they are currently running a pilot scheme to recycle blister packs. This can only be done on an individual basis whereby you can deposit 15 blister packs per month at participating stores, our nearest being on the Longwater trading estate.

If you type 'recycle blister packs at Boots' into a search engine, it will tell you what you need to do and if you manage to complete the process and spend £10 while in store, you will receive 150 points on your Boots advantage card. This is in addition to their other recycling scheme whereby you can recycle five 'difficult to recycle' items, spend £10 and receive 500 points (worth £5) on your advantage card which is a great scheme once you get into the swing of things.



I've collected around £50 worth of points in the past two years. There are other blister pack recycling schemes but I haven't managed to find one which doesn't require you to pay in the area of £75 to purchase their boxes. Aldi is running a scheme in conjunction with Teracycle whereby you could register onto the scheme and send two Freepost envelopes filled with up to 30 blister packs in each per month. However, Aldi are not accepting new registrations presumably because, like me and Supadrug, they hadn't realised the scale of the waste problem but it might be worth watching their site.

Don't invite thieves when you're not at home

It's vital to leave your home secure whenever you leave it. Getting into an 'exit routine' can help ensure that you don't forget obvious, important things, like not leaving your valuables near windows, or no lights on if use cat flaps.

it will be dark before you get home. Here's what you should do just before you go out.

Become a creature of habit Try to get into the habit of following your own course of action when you lock up your home. This will ensure that you don't forget anything.

Here's what we recommend you do before you go out:

- Close and lock all your doors and windows, even if you're only going out for a few minutes
- Double-lock any door
- Make sure that any valuables are



out of sight

- Keep handbags away from the letterbox or cat flap and hide all keys including car keys, as a thief could hook keys or valuables through even a small opening
- Never leave car

documents or ID in obvious places such as kitchens or hallways

- In the evening, shut the curtains and leave lights on
- If you're out all day, then it's advisable to use a timer device to automatically turn lights and a radio on at night
- Set your burglar alarm
- Make sure the side gate is locked
- Lock your shed or garage
- Lock your bike inside a secure shed or garage, to a robust fitting bolted to the ground or wall, like a ground anchor.

An Easton couple has set up a small library outside their house for the benefit of the local community. Dominick Allen and his wife, Holly moved to Easton from Norwich in 2022 and both work mainly from home – Dominick in pest control and Holly re-designs websites and apps, to make them easier for people to use.

"Because we are at home a lot, we see quite a few people walking their children to school, or walking their dog" Dominick explained. "So we thought it might be a nice thing to set up a library to encourage people young and old to

pick up a book.

"If it's not one out of our library it might remind them of one on their own shelf they have been meaning to start. At the very least we thought it might put a smile on a few people's faces."

While on holiday, Dominick and Holly had seen other community libraries in other parts of the UK and once they had set up theirs, they discovered a nonprofit organisation called 'Little Free Library'. It is mainly US focused, but has a map of all the Little Free Libraries worldwide and helped them get some ideas to make theirs

even more exciting, such as leaving a guestbook for visitors to sign and providing free handmade bookmarks.

"So far we've had a variety of books both paperbacks and hardbacks with guite a few Clive Cussler and James Patterson" explained Dominick.

"We've had a few children's books too, but not as many as the rest despite children being our most popular visitors to the library". The pair posted about the library

on the Nextdoor website and had many positive responses with people already coming to drop bags of books off. They plan to rotate the books they have so there should always be something different.

Dominick himself admits he reads lots of horror and weird fiction whereas Holly enjoys fantasy and regency books.

You will find the library outside their house in Kennedy Close in Easton.

Tapping into secrets of the Bayeux tapestry

I'm sure you have all heard of the Bayeux Tapestry from your school history lessons – some of you may even have seen it.

Well, Norwich Friends' are carefully stitching a tapestry to be hung in the reborn Norwich Castle which is a unique piece in the style of the one at Bayeux.

I visited The Forum this summer and saw some of the volunteers working on it – it really is an incredible feat of workmanship.

The Norwich Friends' Tapestry is being funded by a gift from the Friends of the Norwich Museums. It forms part of the National Lottery Heritage Fund re-development project, Norwich Castle: Royal Palace Reborn.

The Norwich Friends Tapestry is technically a piece of embroidery. Its name, however, maintains a close association with the famous Bayeux Tapestry. The medieval original was a model for the elongated format, the drawing style, and the embroidery technique. This stunning piece is being created by a team of dedicated volunteers who have spent months mastering the original Bayeux stitch. Every single element is being embroidered by hand. As well as using the original stitch, the colours, motifs and style match those of the Bayeux Tapestry. However, the stories it tells are completely unique to Norwich.

The tales on the tapestry

The textile depicts events that followed the Norman Conquest. It narrates stories of East Anglian rebellions against the Normal rule, and against William I (William the Conqueror), the first Norman king. The first story is that of the Anglo-Saxon resistance leader Hereward the Wake. The second story narrates the so-called Rebellion of the Three Earls. This depiction of dramatic local events and fighting in the fens and Norfolk includes the siege of Norwich Castle in 1075.

Creating the tapestry
The detailed design has been

created by illustrator Fiona Gowen, based on storyboards researched and written by the curatorial team. The result will be a stunning 20-metre-long embroidery which will adorn the walls of Norwich Castle Keep when it re-opens. You'll be able to see the Norman layout of the keep and the original rooms filled with the rich furnishings and textiles of a royal palace. The volunteer team will also create wall hangings, banners and period costumes.


Please ensure that paths running along boundaries are kept clear to allow pedestrians unobstructed access.

Annual budget setting

At the November parish council meeting, the 2025/26 budget for the parish council will be considered and agreed.

The parish council is responsible for a number of functions in the village including the emptying of dog waste bins, grass cutting of the play areas and Marlingford conservation area, the upkeep of a number of assets including grit bins, dog waste bins and noticeboards.

In addition the council currently gives grant donations to the church for the maintenance of the churchyards and a contribution



towards *The Grapevine* magazine and, in 24/25, donations to the village halls.

The parish council precept, or contribution towards financing the council budget, is part of the council tax bill that is collected by South Norfolk Council.

It also includes contributions towards Norfolk County Council, South Norfolk Council and the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner.

Members of the public are welcome to attend the meeting and listen to discussions as the budget for the ensuing year is agreed.

Parish council meetings are usually held on the second Tuesday of alternate months at 7pm.

At each meeting there is an opportunity for members of the public to speak and raise any issues they may have. You are also welcome to simply come along and listen to the meeting.

Tackling vandalism

It is extremely disappointing to have to report an increase in vandalism in our village.

The bus-stop on Dereham Road near Marlingford Road towards Dereham was damaged recently, as was some of the wire fencing on Jubilee playing field – both coming at a time where the council finds it difficult to cover the financial burden for repairs.

We would ask anyone who witnesses such vandalism to please make sure it is reported to

the police and the parish council.

Speeding and new speed limits

Many of you may have noticed the new village speed limit sign erected on Dereham Road at the junction to Dunham Road. As from September 30, 2024 these new speed limits will be in force. The 30mph limit has been extended to Dunham Road with the remainder of Dereham Road towards the Longwater interchange being reduced to 40mph. Further signage will be installed on Dereham Road as well as at the showground end in due course. We have also received reports of excessive speed on Bawburgh Road towards Easton Gym Club, a posted 30mph limit.

We will seek support from Norfolk police requesting random speed monitoring as well as utilising our own SAMs machines.

Hedges causing obstruction

We have received reports of overgrown hedges obstructing footpaths within the village and forcing pedestrians to walk on the road to avoid them.

With October 1 being the start of the autumn hedge-cutting season, we hope to see these hedges being cut back. If your hedge is overhanging the footpath, please

take this opportunity to trim back and ensure the footpaths remain clear.

Parking

A number of complaints have been received about parking on the footpaths on Marlingford Road, Dereham Road, Woodview Road and around St Peter's school. Parking on the footpath restricts all users and forces them onto the highway.

We are seeking advice and support from Norfolk police moving forward and we will encourage them to take enforcement action. Vehicles identified as an obstruction will be reported to district council and the police. Please have consideration for all when parking your vehicle.

We're in the month for remembering...

'November' is Latin for ninth month – which it was when the Romans counted the year as beginning in March. In Finnish, the month is named *marraskuu* which means 'death month' because by November, the plants of summer have gone, and the land seems dead – a much more descriptive name.

If we were to choose a new name for the month in English, we could do worse than Remembermoon because it's a month of remembering. November 1 is All Saints' Day (or All Hallows, which is why October 31 is All Hallows' Eve – Halloween). This is the day the Church remembers the 'saints' throughout the centuries of Christian history. These aren't just the famous ones, with miraculous backstories seen in stained glass windows, but all who counted themselves as a follower of Jesus. November 2 is All Souls' day - also called the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed. This may sound like the same people who are remembered on All Saints, but All Souls is about

remembering those people as our loved ones.

On November 5, we remember, remember the plot to destroy parliament. November 11 is Armistice Day with the nearest Sunday being Remembrance Sunday when we remember those killed in

wars past and present. And this year we invite you to explore the theme of 'Remembering' further at our Arts and Crafts **Exhibition during Remembrance** Weekend, November 9-10. at St Peter's Church, Easton. The Christian faith emphasises remembering because it is, above all, a historical faith – Christians believe that certain things actually happened and that those past happenings have consequences for our present and our future. Jesus' resurrection is not just a nice concept or a theological parable: it's a historical event – it has a when, a where and a who. But November can be a tough month as the days shorten, the weather deteriorates and the land 'dies'. Remembering can become a burden and it's important to take care of each other and of ourselves. Then, at the end of the month, the tone changes from remembering to preparation as Christians celebrate Christ as ruler over the universe, and Advent begins. December in Finnish is *joulukuu* which means

'Christmas month' when we remember that darkness and death don't have the last word. God arrived at a 'when', in a 'where' and as a 'who' – Jesus born at Bethlehem – to bring light and life for all.
