



Never take dangerous chances on rural roads

Rural roads disproportionately account for the number of serious collisions our Roads and Armed Policing Team deal with.

Since Norfolk has no motorways, many of our roads are considered rural and, with harvests under way, we can expect more slow-moving vehicles on them.

Getting stuck behind a tractor pulling several tonnes of grain for a couple of miles is not much different to sitting at a red light for two minutes. However some people take unnecessary risks when overtaking slow-moving tractors, putting themselves and other users in harm's way. All motorists are advised to pass farm machinery slowly, to give them space and to remember these vehicles are legally entitled to use the road. One final thing to mention around rural roads is the speed limits.



The national speed limit often applies but that does not mean you have to do 60mph.

You should always drive according to conditions. You never know what might be around the corner and the question to ask yourself is could you stop if you needed to if you encountered another vehicle or a child on a bike or a family out on a walk?

and brings in the catch of the day, a fat mirror.

No sign of a tench, though. It's an early pack-up – Milton has a pub quiz and is in with a shout of the top prize – and our weary heroes head home.

Parish meeting

A parishioner thanked the council for repairing the village sign which was much improved.

There was also praise for the new website which is in the process of being updated and was said to be easier to use.

Cllr Caton said that the question of the provision of playground

equipment to a school in the village was being looked into. **Noisy Iorries**

There was a complaint that

lorries were delivering to the new community centre at 7.30am and disturbing villagers. Cllr McCarter assured them that there had been no deliveries to the community centre and that Cllr Dewsbury had looked into the early morning noise and discovered that the lorries were delivering cables for the new windfarms. Cllr Caton added that he thought this was finished for now.

Community centre

After a request from a parishioner asking when the new community centre would be open and when the hall finances would be made public, Cllr Caton advised that people would be informed of the costings after the council was in a position to know what had been spent in total, which invoices had been paid and how much was needed for the hall to be finished. He said as soon as the

council had this information, a public meeting would be held to inform all residents of the findings.

Allotments

Get to know your local defibrillator

There is a defibrillator outside **Easton village hall** and the **Rembrandt restaurant** but would you know how to use it?

Anyone can use a defibrillator and you don't need training.

Step 1: Once you have accessed a defibrillator by dialling 999, turn it on by pressing the green button.

Step 2: Peel off the sticky pads and attach them to the patient's skin, one on each side of the chest, as shown in the picture on the defibrillator.

Step 3: Once the pads have been attached, stop CPR and don't touch the patient. The defibrillator will then check the patient's heart rhythm.

Step 4: The defibrillator will decide whether a shock is needed and if so, it will tell you to press

the shock button. An automatic defibrillator will shock the patient without prompt. Don't



touch the patient while they are being shocked.

Step 5: The defibrillator will tell you when the shock has been delivered and whether you need to continue CPR.

Step 6: Continue with chest compressions until the patient shows signs of life or the defibrillator tells you to stop so it can analyse the heartbeat again. The device checks the heart rhythm and will only tell you to shock if it's needed. You can't shock someone accidentally.

Colton resident David Wildon – an appreciation

On July 27, our friend and neighbour David Wildon sadly passed away at Hethersett Hall Care Home.

From the plethora of messages of condolence, it is evident that he was a much respected and admired member of the Colton community.

David and his wife Gilly moved to

Colton in 1974 and, since then, he

has made a significant contribution to our neighbourhood mostly through his years of service on, and as chairman of, Marlingford and Colton Parish Council. . David had, for example, been instrumental in the development of the Parish Plan which led directly to the construction of the Social Housing on Marlingford Road. He was also active in opposing Norwich City Council's abortive bid to absorb several rural parishes, RG Carter's attempts to re-open Colton quarry, and objecting to the Food Hub, subsequently helping to negotiate amelioration measures. David also participated in various consultations over plans and proposals for the Greater Norwich Local Plan, highways development and many other matters. As many residents will recall, David

was originally from Australia,

having been born in 1937 in

Naracoorte, South Australia.
He was educated at
Sydney Boys High School
and the University of
Sydney where he
graduated in 1960 with a
B.Sc. in Agriculture.

Having completed further research, he was awarded his PhD in 1967 along with a travelling fellowship. It was for this reason that he came to the UK and became a lecturer at the School of Biological Sciences in the newly constituted University of East Anglia.

David remained at the UEA for the rest of his academic career which ultimately lead to a three-year appointment as Dean of the School of Biological Sciences.

He retired shortly afterwards. David and Gilly married in 1968 and their son Mark, from early beginnings at primary school in Barford, has gone on to become professor of Mathematics at the University of Bristol.

Of the many tributes made to David, members of our community have variously described him as "remarkable, gentle, kind, a fantastic intellect, charming, a great friend, lovely, wonderful, genuine, thorough, remarkable, fair..."

David has been a valued member of our village and will be much missed. Our thoughts and prayers are with Gilly, Mark, and the rest of his family here, and in Australia, at this sad time. There will be a private (family only) committal and burial at 10am on Wednesday, September 18, at St Andrew's Church. This will be followed by a memorial service at 11am, also at St Andrew's, to which all are welcome. There will be refreshments afterwards at the Old Horse and Groom, The Street, Colton, to which all are invited
